# Approaches to Healthy People 2010

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- Use *Healthy People 2010*
  - As a data resource
  - As a vehicle to involve the public, media, and elected officials
- Use *Healthy People 2010* as a basis to form coalitions and partnerships with community-based groups
  - To define common ground
  - As a common template
- Use *Healthy People 2010* to form the basis of agreements and interactions with government



# What is IPLAN?

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## A community health assessment and planning process--

- conducted by local health jurisdictions in Illinois as part of the certification process
- grounded in the core functions of public health
- addresses public health practice standards

# Why does IPLAN contain Healthy People 2010 Objectives

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In the Administrative Code....

The plan shall contain:


**“A description of each priority including the importance of the priority health need, summarized data and information on which the priority is based, the relationship of the priority to Healthy People 2000 National Health Objectives and subsequent revisions and factors influencing the level of the problem (e.g., risk factors, contributing and indirect contributing factors);”**



# Healthy People and IPLAN

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References to *Healthy People* can be found in **four** different locations in the IPLAN training manual:

1. The **Community Health Assessment & Planning Section** identifies HP2000 as a one of the six planning resources
2. The **Computer Based Assessment Tools Section** explains how the IPLAN database automatically provides information on HP2000 objectives. 

# Healthy People and IPLAN

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3. One of the community health models listed in *Appendix B*, Healthy Communities 2000, uses the HP2000 objectives.
4. *Appendix D* lists child health indicators and their corresponding HP2000 objectives.



# IPLAN Data System

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## ➤ Indicators:

- demographic and socioeconomic characteristics
- general health and access to care
- maternal and child health
- chronic disease
- infectious disease
- environmental, occupational, and injury control
- sentinel events





# IPLAN Indicators

## *& Healthy People 2010 Objectives*

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The IPLAN Data System has 87 indicators. Of these,

- 32 indicators contain HP 2010 Objective data
- 13 indicators do not contain HP 2010 Objective data due to slight differences in definitions
- 42 indicators are not Healthy People related (i.e. Population data)



# Community Participation


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- **Involvement by representatives of various community interests and groups such as:**
  - Medical Community
  - Mental Health and Social Services Agencies
  - Schools
  - Law Enforcement
  - Voluntary Organizations
  - Cooperative Extension Service
  - Farm Bureau
  - Business Community
  - Clergy
  - Economic Development Agencies

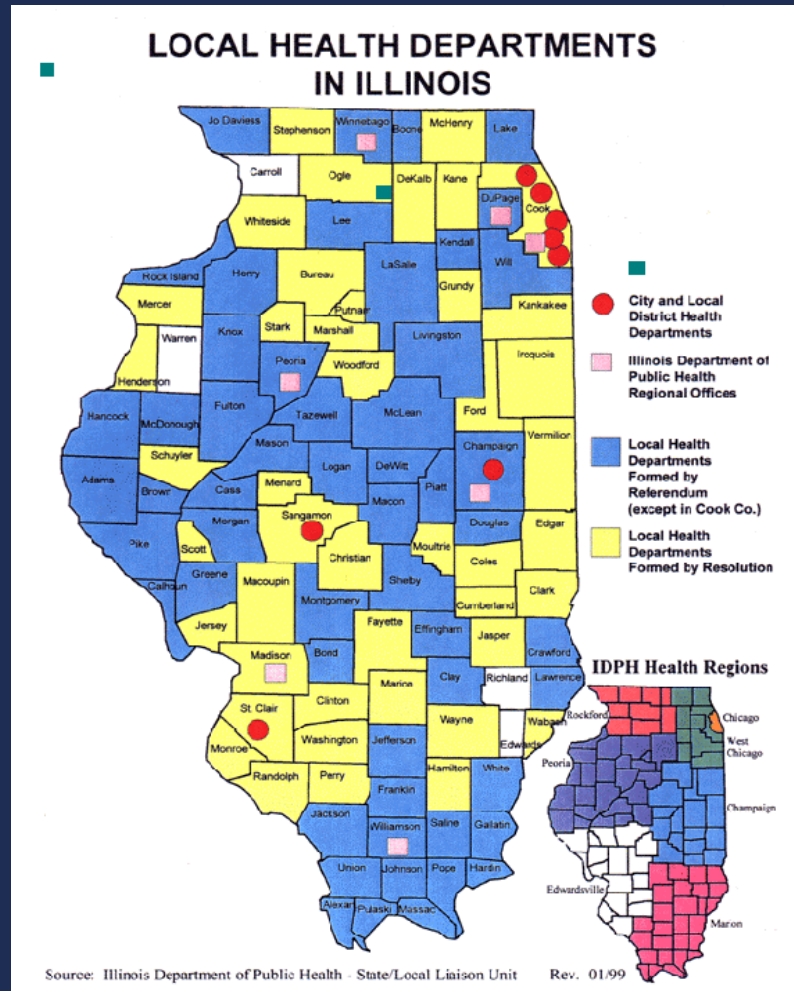


# Community Team:

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- Conducts a community health needs assessment
  - Identifies priority health problems from the findings of the health needs assessment
  - Analyzes health risk factors and community resources available to address problems
  - Establishes measurable health objectives and intervention strategies to correct problems
  - Submits the plan for adoption by the local board of health
  - Approved plan submitted to Department of Public Health as part of re-certification requirement
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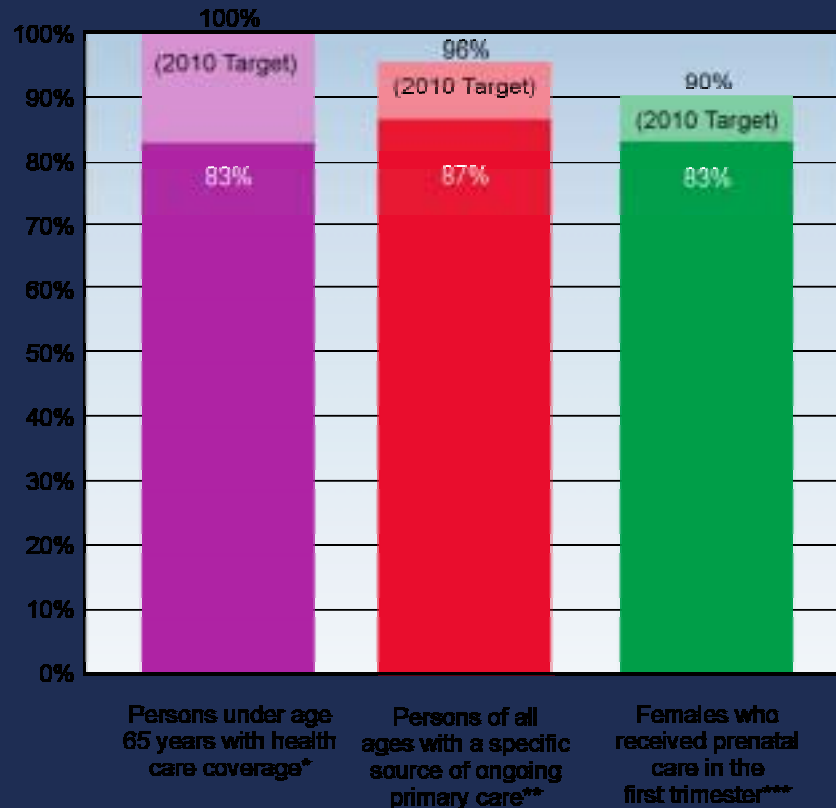

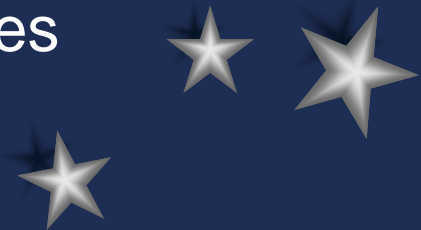


# Sharing Health Assessment Results Electronically- **SHARE**

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A searchable database, embedded in the IPLAN Data System, to identify and link communities that have selected particular health priorities.

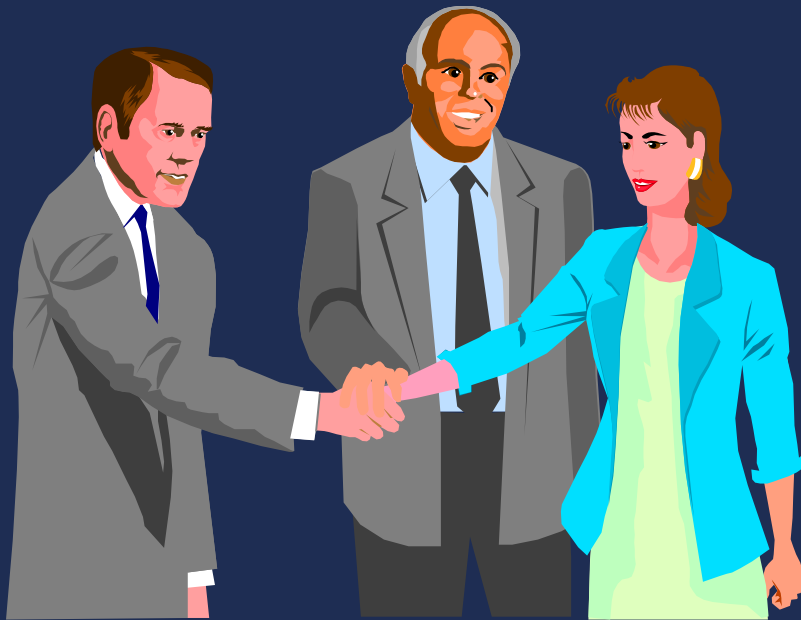
- Health Department Contact Information

# SHARE - Applications

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## Local connections:

- Enhancing capacity by linking jurisdictions with similar issues to share successes and lessons learned

## Technical assistance:

- Identifying local jurisdictions with similar priorities in order to link with state program experts

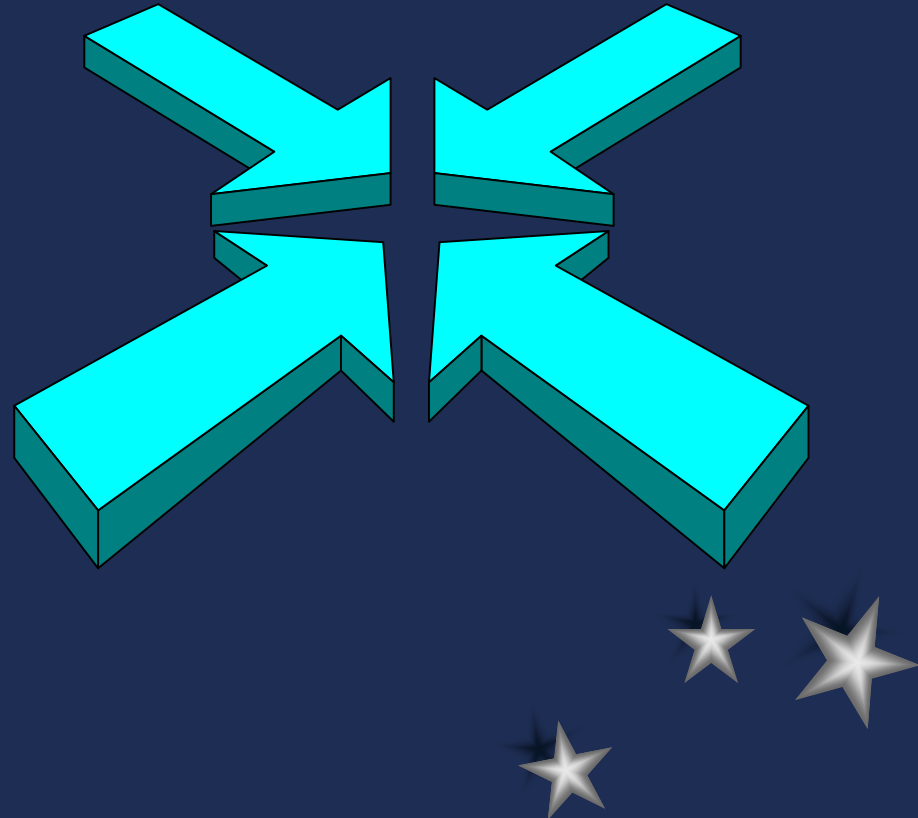




# SHARE - Potential Impacts
