communication tools to proactively promote the agency's programs and initiatives, improve communication pathways with historically overlooked communities, and correct erroneous information by tackling disinformation head-on.

In addition, IDPH has laid out key priorities in two other major documents, **the State Health**Improvement Plan ("Healthy Illinois 2028")
and the COVID-19 After Action Report.

Healthy Illinois 2028 identifies five major public health priorities for the next five years:

- Chronic Disease
- Emerging Diseases
- Maternal and Infant Health
- Mental Health and Substance Use Disorder
- Racism as a Public Health Crisis

The COVID-19 After-Action Report was developed in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic and lays out strategies for addressing future public health emergencies.

Its recommendations center on:

- Improving Preparedness
- Modernizing Systems
- Investing in Communities and Continuing to Build Public Trust

Introduction to IDPH Programs

IDPH has 200 different programs that benefit each state resident and visitor, although its daily activities of maintaining the public's health are rarely noticed unless a breakdown in the



system occurs. With the assistance of local public health agencies, these essential programs and services make up Illinois' public health system, a system that forms a frontline defense against disease through preventive measures and education. Public health has provided the foundation for remarkable gains in saving lives and reducing suffering. Today, life expectancy is 80 years for women and 75 years for men, compared with fewer than 50 years at the beginning of the 20th century.

In the past, IDPH directed state efforts to control smallpox, cholera, and typhoid; virtually eliminated polio; reduced dental decay through fluoridation of community water supplies; and corrected sanitary conditions threatening water and food supplies.

Today, IDPH has programs to deal with persistent problems that require continued vigilance – infectious diseases, such as AIDS (acquired immunodeficiency syndrome), HIV (human immunodeficiency virus), SARS (severe acute respiratory syndrome), and meningococcal disease; foodborne and communicable diseases, such as E. coli 0157: H7, monkeypox, salmonella, and West Nile virus; vaccine–preventable diseases; lead poisoning; lack of health care in rural areas; health disparities among racial groups in breast, cervical and prostate cancer; Alzheimer's disease; and other health threats — sexually transmitted diseases, tobacco use, violence, and other conditions associated with high–risk behaviors. In addition, IDPH has been charged with handling the state's response to the COVID–19 pandemic and the threat of bioterrorism.

IDPH, one of the state's oldest agencies, was first organized in 1877 with a staff of three and a two-year budget of \$5,000. IDPH now has an annual budget of \$1.7 billion in state and federal funds, headquarters in Springfield and Chicago, six regional offices around the state, three laboratories, and 1,300 employees. IDPH is organized into 13 offices, each addressing a distinct area of public health. Each office operates and supports numerous ongoing programs and is prepared to respond to extraordinary situations.

Women's Health and Family Services

Office of Disease Control

The Office of Disease Control (ODC) administers programs to prevent and control infectious and communicable diseases, to reduce and eliminate exposure, and to ensure population health, safety, and well-being. Formerly a unit of the Office of Health Protection, ODC was created out of necessity from the COVID-19 pandemic response. ODC focuses on limiting the spread of transmissible diseases with increased response teams and appropriate span of control.

Office of Health Care Regulation

The Office of Health Care Regulation (OHCR) licenses, inspects, and regulates a wide range of facilities, providers, and programs in support of IDPH's mission to serve as an advocate and partner with the people of Illinois.

OHCR licenses and inspects more than 1,500 long-term care facilities, including, but not limited to, those providing skilled nursing, specialized mental health rehabilitation services, and care for individuals with intellectually complex/developmentally disabled needs. OHCR also licenses and regulates more than 2,000 home health, hospice, home services, home nursing, and home placement providers. In addition, under the auspices of the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments (CLIA), OHCR is responsible for overseeing laboratories, performing various certification surveys, and investigating complaints.

Office of Health Promotion

The Office of Health Promotion (OHPm) focuses on the health and wellness of Illinois residents by encouraging healthy lifestyles and by supporting screening, early detection, and appropriate intervention for non-communicable diseases and conditions. The office addresses chronic diseases, oral health, vision and hearing, newborn screening, violence/injury prevention, and overdose surveillance and response. Additionally, the office provides access to medical cannabis to patients with qualifying conditions through the Medical Cannabis Patient Registry Program.

Other OHPm initiatives include the Community Health Worker (CHW) Certification Program and the Division of Emerging Health Issues, which includes the Violence and Injury Prevention Section (VIPS).

Office of Health Protection

The Office of Health Protection (OHPt) implements programs to reduce the incidence of disease and injury linked to environmental exposures, using surveillance, investigation, licensing, data, stakeholder education, regulation, and enforcement. The two main divisions of OHPt are Environmental Health (EH) and Food, Dairy, and Devices (FDD).

EH includes the Lead Program Asbestos Section, Environmental Health Services, Toxicology Section, and General Engineering Section. FDD includes the Retail Food Program, Dairy Program, Manufactured Food Program, and Body Art and Tanning Program.

Office of Policy, Planning, and Statistics

The Office of Policy, Planning, and Statistics (OPPS) collects, analyzes, and evaluates information on health status, health needs, and disease occurrence in Illinois residents. The office has four divisions: Patient Safety and Quality, Vital Records, the Health Data and Policy, and Epidemiologic Studies. Within these areas, OPPS conducts epidemiologic studies and manages disease registries, supports statewide and local health assessments and surveys, ensures the integrity of vital records, tracks health care service use and patient safety outcomes, administers the Institutional Review Board (IRB), and processes applications for capital improvements to health care facilities.

Office of Preparedness and Response

The Office of Preparedness and Response (OPR) provides emergency response policy–making, planning, training, exercise, as well as incident management and evaluation services for IDPH programs. It coordinates the public health and medical technical services and resources that Illinois provides during a disaster through the Public Health Emergency Operations Center (PHEOC) and the State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC).

OPR is also responsible for administering two federal preparedness grants, the Public Health Emergency Program (PHEP) and the Healthcare Preparedness Program (HPP), funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. OPR provides preparedness funding to 95 LHDs and 10 Regional Health Care Coalitions based across the state through these two federal grants. OPR also administers the Emergency Medical Services for Children (EMSC) Program.

Office of Racial and Cultural Health Equity

The mission of the Office of Racial and Cultural Health Equity (ORCHE) is to improve the health of socioeconomically disadvantaged populations by developing an organizational infrastructure of programs that address inequities and creating data and program measures that address disparities, promote equity, and establish health care policies to improve the health of the population. These are essential functions to improve physical and mental health, address health care disparities, and advance health equity.

The office includes:

- Center for Minority Health Services
- · Center for Rural Health

Office of Women's Health and Family Services

The Office of Women's Health and Family Services (OWHFS) strives to improve the health outcomes of all Illinoisans by providing education and preventative services, increasing health care access, using data to ensure evidence–based practice and policy, and empowering families. The OWHFS administers state and federally funded programs through three main divisions: Maternal Child Health, Women's Health Services, and Population Health.

Maternal Child Health has two primary content areas: Perinatal: Maternal/Infant and Child and Adolescent/School Health. The Division of Women's Health Services oversees the Illinois Breast and Cervical Cancer Program; the Illinois Family Planning Program, also known as Title X; and Illinois (WISE–WOMAN) Well–Integrated Screening and Evaluation for Women Across the Nation. The Division of Population Health serves as OWHFS's main community engagement and communication arm.

Regional Health Officers

IDPH employs six regional health officers (RHO) who help local health department administrators with interpreting and implementing IDPH policy. Each RHO collaborates with IDPH regional personnel responsible for carrying out varied IDPH programs. In addition to overseeing regional office operations, each RHO serves as a resource to their assigned local health departments. In this capacity, they can assist LHD administrators with coordinating and creating community outreach activities that address identified health needs. They serve as a liaison between LHDs and IDPH and bring considerable knowledge regarding their assigned communities. Your designated RHO can assist you in completing the local assessment of needs (IPLAN) required for IDPH certification. Their contact information is listed here.



Illinois Project for local assessment of Needs (IPLAN) which consists of the community health needs assessment and community health plan satisfies three of the nine certification requirements:

4. IPLAN website: Illinois Project for Local Assessment of Needs (IPLAN)

- What is IPLAN? (text straight from the IPLAN website)
 The Illinois Project for Local Assessment of Needs (IPLAN) is a community health assessment and planning process that is conducted every five years by local health jurisdictions in Illinois. Based on the Assessment Protocol for Excellence in Public Health (APEX-PH) model, IPLAN is grounded in the core functions of public health and addresses public health practice standards. The completion of IPLAN fulfills most of the requirements for Local Health Department certification under Illinois Administrative Code Section 600.400: Certified Local Health Department Code Public Health Practice Standards. The essential elements of IPLAN are:
 - 1. an organizational capacity assessment;
 - 2. a community health needs assessment; and
 - 3. a community health plan, focusing on a minimum of three priority health problems.

- c) 2024 Illinois IPLAN Training Webinar Series Topics
 - IPLAN Basics: IPLAN Basics covers the substantial compliance components of the IPLAN process based on APEX-PH, including the core components Community Health Assessment, Community Health Improvement Plan, and Organizational Capacity Assessment.
 - Created August 22, 2024, as part of the 2024 IPLAN webinar series and in collaboration with the Illinois Public Health Institute funded by IDPH from the Community Health Assessment and Planning Grant 2024.
 - MAPP 2.0 Overview: This overview of Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships provides a dive into the newly released MAPP 2.0 sharing the core changes from the previous iteration and alignment with the IPLAN requirements.
 - Created September 26, 2024, as part of the 2024 IPLAN webinar series and in collaboration with the Illinois Public Health Institute, funded by IDPH from the Community Health Assessment and Planning Grant 2024.
 - Integrating Health and Racial Equity into the IPLAN Process: This webinar focuses on helping participants integrate a health and racial equity approach into the Community Health Assessment and Improvement planning, CHA/CHIP. The session focuses on practices, tools, and methods to purposefully center equity into the CHA/CHIP process for improved outcomes.
 - Created October 24, 2024, as part of the 2024 IPLAN webinar series and in collaboration with the Illinois Public Health Institute funded by IDPH from the Community Health Assessment and Planning Grant 2024.
 - Quality Improvement: QI covers key concepts and techniques that apply to continuous improvement processes. This session focuses on quality improvement, quality planning, and performance management approaches to support action planning in the IPLAN process.
 - Created November 21, 2024, as part of the 2024 IPLAN webinar series and in collaboration with the Illinois Public Health Institute funded by IDPH from the Community Health Assessment and Planning Grant 2024.

CEMP

CEMP, or Comprehensive Emergency Management Program is a web-based emergency planning, exercise, and assessment system used by local health departments and hospitals to support emergency planning and exercise activities related to the Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP), Cities Readiness Initiative (CRI), and Hospital Preparedness Program (HPP) grants. CEMP allows horizontal and vertical integration of PHEP, CRI, and HPP planning between statewide, regional, and local partners and stakeholders, as shown below. EGrAMS

EGrAMS, or Electronic Grants Administration and Management System used by IDPH for end-to-end grants management.
